How to find and use books in the University of Osaka Libraries

This is the today's contents of the 1st section.


First, we will explain how to find paper books and electronic books (e-books). Second, we will explain how to borrow paper books.

Finally, we will explain what to do if the book you need is not available at the University of Osaka (hereafter referred to as "UOsaka").

How to find print books and e-books

How to find and use books in the University of Osaka Libraries

Then, let's move on to the first part "How to find print books and e-books".



If you want to search for books owned by UOsaka, you can use the Online Catalog, called OPAC.

Through OPAC, you can find all books in UOsaka Libraries, including both ebooks and print books.


- **How to access OPAC:
- 1.Enter "UOsaka Libraries" into a search engine.
- 2. Click on the official library website.
- 3. If the Japanese page appears, change the language to English by clicking the language icon.

This will bring you to the English version of the library website.**

On this website, the "Catalog" search is the OPAC search.

You can also access OPAC on your mobile devices.

Enter your keywords, such as a book title, in the search box and click the search icon.



About keywords, I'll recommend one useful tip, the prefix search.

If you type a word and add "asterisk" at last, OPAC will find all word which include the word you type.

That's how to do the prefix search.


For example, if you type europe *asterisk*, all words that begin with "europe" such as "european" are also searched.

Let's try to use the prefix search.

My keyword is "west asterisk Europe asterisk".

This shows search results of OPAC.

You can see that the results include "western" and "European".




You can narrow down your results by some filters, like text language, library location and so on.

If you want to search only English books, click "English" and refine the results. Here you can see the result of only English books.

In addition, you can sort this list by publication year in the "Sort" window.

Now, the books are in line from the newest.

And you can reset the filter by clicking on this "minus" button.



Next, I'll show you how to access e-books from OPAC.


In the results list, if you see the "E-book" icon, it means that the item is available as an electronic book.

Click the book title, and OPAC will open a new page with detailed information about the item.

Here, by clicking the "E-book" icon, you can access the item immediately if you are on campus.

If you want to access from outside the campus, "off campus", you are required to log in with your Osaka University Personal ID & Password. After logging in, you can access the item.

You can also find and use "e-journals" in OPAC in the same way.



Next, I'll introduce how to find print books in UOsaka Libraries.

In the results list, if you find the "book" icon, that means it is the printed book. Let's check this book.

To borrow or see this book, please make sure to check three points; Location, Call No. and Status.

Let's take a look at the "Location".

Location shows the library name and where the book is arranged in the library. "Main Lib." means Main Library in Toyonaka Campus.

By clicking the location name, you can see the map.

In Main Library, most of English books are located inside "stacks".

The second point, "Call No". This number is labelled on the spine of books. Within the location, books are organized in numerical and alphabetical order. There are so many books on the shelf, so please remember to take a note of this number.

The third point, "Status". If the book is not checked out, "Status" field is blank. But, if someone has already borrowed the book, the OPAC displays the status "Borrowed".

Thus, you have to check 3 points "Location" "Call No" and "Status". When you can't find the book on the shelf, please feel free to ask staff at the library desk.

Next, I'll explain a convenient service called "Holds/Delivery Requests."

Before we move on to the explanation of Quick Pickup, do you know how many libraries there are at UOsaka?

UOsaka Libraries consist of four libraries:

the Main Library on Toyonaka Campus, the Life Sciences Library and the Science and Engineering Library on Suita Campus, and the International Studies Library on Minoh Campus.

Roughly speaking, the library closest to your laboratory has the largest collection related to your field.

If you have any questions about using the library or searching for literature, please ask the staff at the nearest library.

So, let's get back to the main topic of "Holds/Delivery Requests." If the book you need is in a library on another campus, you can use this service.

This service is easy to apply for, and it's free. Let me show you how it works. For example, suppose the book you need is located in the International Studies Library on Minoh Campus, but you want to receive this book at the Main Library on Toyonaka Campus. In this case, click the "Hold" button.

After you log in with your Osaka University Personal ID & Password, please select the library where you would like to pick up this item. The book will be delivered within three weekdays, and we will notify you by email when it's ready.
